## Our Mission

The mission of Emma Norton Services is to foster stability and personal growth for women and families who are homeless, or at risk of becoming homeless, by providing affordable, secure housing and supportive services in a Christian environment.

## Our Goals

- To provide safe, secure housing for women and families in transition.
- To provide support, advocacy, and referrals to community services for individuals and families striving to stabilize their lives.
- To keep rents affordable, despite rising costs of services, by seeking funds to serve those with the greatest needs.
- To provide support to help women build confidence and become self-sufficient.
- To involve communities of faith in our programs serving women and their children.
- To work with families of hospital patients needing temporary housing.

## Emma Norton Services

is a nonprofit organization serving women and families in the Twin Cities metropolitan area of Minnesota. The original residence, the Methodist Girls Club, opened in 1917 to provide housing for young women. When this facility closed in 1967, Emma Norton Residence was built and named after the woman whose gift helped make it possible, Mrs. Emma (Hayes) Norton. The residence provided safe and affordable housing for fifty-five young women who had come to the Twin Cities to work or attend school.

In 1971 the residence was modified and staff were trained to meet the needs of young students who were Deaf or Hard of Hearing. In 1976 the

Wesley Family Program was started — providing housing for families with loved ones undergoing long-term recovery at nearby hospitals. Today, families from twenty-eight countries and all fifty states have stayed at Emma Norton Residence.

Responding to the changing needs of women in a growing and increasingly diverse metropolitan area, Emma Norton Services began offering programs and services for women and families who were vulnerable or in transition in the early 1990's. Many of these women were homeless and dealing with the effects of mental illness, chemical dependency, or domestic abuse.

Today, the forty-two bed Emma Norton Residence offers on-site support and services for homeless women in transition through the Jane Addams Transitional Housing Program, the Dual Disorder Program, and the Scattered Site Family Reunification Program. In 2002, Emma's Place opened, providing permanent housing for homeless, single-parent families.

## From the Board President and Executive Director

### Dear Friends and Supporters,

This year was one of exciting growth and change for us! We completed the first phase of our financial campaign to raise \$3.5 million for Emma's Place and construction began in October. Much more than just affordable permanent housing, our townhomes will provide life skills training, after-school programming, and access to community support services for homeless, single-parent families who have four or more children. Our goal is to help these families become stable and self-sufficient.

Another major change for us in 2001 was our name. Because of our growing ministry, we felt it was time to recognize *all* of the services provided by our different programs. Thus, we changed our name from "Emma Norton Residence" to "Emma Norton Services." We also updated our image with a new logo and brochure and adopted a more professional design for our newsletter and annual report.

Our new image and growing ministry reflect our strong community connections. The Nelda Rhoades Clarke Street Worker of the Year Award, given by the St. Paul Area Coalition for the Homeless, is a testament to that. The 2001 award recognizes Kathleen O'Conner with Project Hope of Southern Minnesota Regional Legal Services, and Scott Barton from Catholic Charities Dorothy Day Center. Both are advocates who do hands-on work with the homeless where they live — under bridges, on the streets, and in homeless camps and shelters.

Of course, the women and families we served in 2001 are our most significant accomplishment. Eighty-seven women were residents of Emma Norton Residence and received services through the Jane Addams Transitional Housing and Dual Disorder Programs. Thirteen women with thirty-five children were served through the Scattered Site Reunification Program. And, thirty-one families from eleven states and three different countries stayed with us through the Wesley Family Program.

None of our work would be possible without the support of our amazing staff and outstanding volunteers. As one of our volunteers said, "The staff are the most dedicated, caring, understanding, humble, and qualified people I've met." And in the words of one of our staff, "Our volunteers shower our residents with love and care."

Finally, we want to thank our many donors and community partners who have helped make Emma Norton Services a stronger organization in the past year. Working together, we can continue to help women and families achieve goals they never thought possible.

### Ruby's Story

Ruby credits the support she received at Emma Norton Residence for changing her life. Five years ago, she was referred to us after having been through multiple treatment programs for years of drug and alcohol abuse. Suffering from recurring depression and in her mid-forties, she was both a mother and grandmother but had no contact with her children.

In our Dual Disorder Program, Ruby received the encouragement she needed to stay on her medication to control her depression. After six months, she moved to our Transitional Housing Program and set her goals high — to maintain her sobriety, get a full-time job, and renew her relationship with her children and grandchildren. In the summer of 2001, Ruby moved to her own apartment. She remains stable and sober and sees her grandchildren regularly.



### Emma Norton Residence

Emma Norton Residence gives women like Ruby a chance to rebuild their lives. Located near downtown St. Paul, the forty-two bed residence provides safe, secure, and affordable housing for women in transition due to domestic abuse, unemployment, mental health issues, chemical dependency, or other reasons. While residents, the women participate in the Dual Disorder or Transitional Housing Programs.

*In 2001, Emma Norton Residence programs served eighty-seven women.* Of the fifty-six women who left the program during the year, fully fifty percent left in “good standing.” This is a measure of the true success of the programs — these women reached one or more of their goals, maintained their sobriety, and continued to work or go to school.

### Dual Disorder Program

Ten of the residence beds are reserved for homeless women in this program. For four to six months, they work closely with staff to stabilize their chemical dependency and mental health issues.

### Jane Addams Transitional Housing Program

This program is for women in transition who have set short- and long-term goals toward independence and self-sufficiency. They agree to spend time in school, at work, or in some other self-improvement program, and participate in workshops and community building activities.

### Wesley Family Program

Also located at the Emma Norton Residence, this program provides rooms and meals at a nominal fee for family members with critically ill relatives in Twin City hospitals. *In 2001, thirty-one families from eleven different states and three different countries used this program.*

### Delilah’s Story

Delilah has overcome more than her share of challenges in her lifetime. Sexually abused by family members as a child, she married when she was a teen and suffered years of physical abuse at the hands of her husband. When she entered a battered woman’s shelter in fear for her life, she became homeless and was unable to provide support for her six children who were placed in foster care.

In 1999, Delilah entered the Scattered Site Family Reunification Program in hope of being reunited with her children. To deal with the effects of a lifetime of abuse, she began seeing a therapist and attended parent education classes. She completed her GED and went through a job-training program at Goodwill EasterSeals.

After two years in our program, Delilah got a good job with a local corporation and received a certificate for Section 8 subsidized housing. Finally able to reunite with all of her children, Delilah continued to make positive changes in her life. She worked hard to be promoted, bought a car, and remarried. She recently celebrated the fact that she’s completely self-supporting and now living in a loving, non-violent home.

### Scattered Site Family Reunification Program

*In 2001, this program served thirteen women with thirty-five children.* Part of the ROOF project, this two-year program is run in conjunction with the Wilder Foundation and funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Homeless families, committed to being reunited, are sponsored or mentored with communities of faith. Resources and support are provided to help them become stable and find affordable permanent housing.

### Emma's Place

The tremendous success of the Scattered Site Family Reunification Program helped us see that there were just too many families who were being adversely affected because of a lack of affordable housing. Thus, the idea — the vision — of Emma's Place was born.

*In 2001, three years of planning and fund raising culminated in the April groundbreaking for Emma's Place — permanent affordable housing for thirteen homeless single-parent families with four or more children.*

Construction began in October 2001 and the first families were scheduled to move in to their new homes in June 2002.

Emma's Place is a community effort. Many individuals, organizations, and communities of faith helped make it happen. Emma Norton Services also established two new partnerships to help run Emma's Place after it was built. The North East Metropolitan Coalition for Affordable Housing (NEMCAH) and the General Board of Global Ministries, Women's Division, will help us ensure the work of Emma's Place is sustained.

**The generosity of our volunteers** made Emma Norton Residence a better place to live in 2001. *Three hundred and eighty people gave over 1,700 hours (worth \$27,285) of their time and talent* — making the residence a warmer, more cheerful, and embracing place to live.

Volunteers made a difference in dozens of ways — teaching craft sessions; coordinating social activities; providing tax assistance; holding monthly birthday parties; addressing and sorting mailings; gardening; cleaning; cooking; painting the bedrooms, hallways, and the dining room; and providing food and gifts for Christmas and Thanksgiving.

*Pastor and Mrs. Phil Bradley from the First United Methodist Church in Mayfield, Kentucky* led a group of six hard-working and enthusiastic senior high school students as they painted the residence halls and washed all the mini-blinds in the entire building!

*Joan Spivey*, who received one of our 2001 Time and Talent Awards, contributed over two-hundred volunteer hours. She graciously helped wherever she was needed — washing dishes, playing the keyboard for Emma’s Singers, painting rooms and offices, wrapping Christmas gifts, shopping for toys for the Scattered Site Program Santa bag, and helping put Easter baskets together.

*Lucille Prinsen* from Dexter, Minnesota was a live-in volunteer for eight weeks. She contributed two-hundred fifteen hours by helping out at the reception desk and in the kitchen, organizing the craft closet, helping with birthday parties and the Halloween party, wrapping Christmas gifts, and in so many other ways.

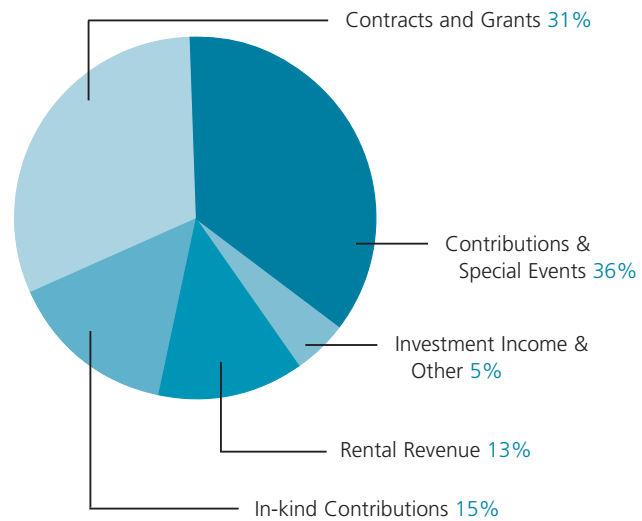

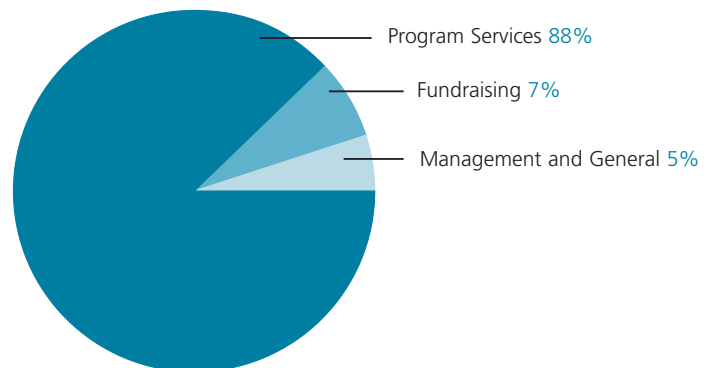
